Celebrating the Liturgy of the Word in Dungog Parish

I would like to propose a small change to the way the Liturgy of the Word is celebrating, primarily in the Dungog Parish (i.e., at St Patrick's and St Mary's). The explanation, however, might be worth reading by everyone.

Everyone would be aware that our Mass—both weekdays and Sundays—contains two primary parts, the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. The other parts—the Introductory Rites and the Concluding Rites—are the two parts that 'bookend' the whole celebration.

Each of these two parts has a different focus of attention: the Liturgy of the Eucharist as the altar as its focus, while the Liturgy of the Word is focussed on ambo. The ambo and the altar, together with the Presider's Chair, are considered the primary liturgical focus points within a church building.

The ambo and altar are so important for their respective parts of the Mass that they are sometimes referred to as the 'two tables' that offer nourishment to those attending, the first with the Word of God, and the second with the Body and Blood of Christ.

In the same way that the altar is where the overwhelming majority of the Liturgy of the Eucharist is celebrated, the ambo is the place where the overwhelming majority of the Liturgy of the Word is celebrated.

During the Liturgy of the Word, the following actions take place (or can take place) at the ambo:

- All the readings: First Reading, Second Reading, and the Gospel;
- The Responsorial Psalm: either in song or spoken (or some mixture thereof);
- The Homily: although it is also possible for the homily to be preached at some other 'suitable place'); and
- The Universal Prayer (the current name of the 'Prayer of the Faithful').

Only the Profession of Faith is not celebrated at the ambo, largely because it is something that everyone says together.

And so, the proposed change:

I would like to request that the Universal Prayer is led from the ambo, in keeping with the significance of that 'table' from which we are nourished.

I understand the reasoning behind having the intercessions—the 'prayer of the people'—led from a place among the people, yet such a

practice forgets that the person leading the intercession is undertaking a 'ministerial' role in a similar way to the person who proclaims the readings. They are acting on our behalf during the Liturgy of the Word since it is not possible for the whole gathering to undertake these roles (though I have seen it tried in some places!).

It is only appropriate to have all those who minister to us during the Liturgy of the Word doing so from the same place, the ambo, that place where we are nourished by the Word of God proclaimed.

I recognise that while this might appear a small change in one sense, there are some parishioners who currently lead the intercessions of the Universal Prayer who will not feel comfortable doing so from the ambo. I regret that you may choose not to be involved, and I offer my heartfelt apologies—and my thanks for your past contributions.

If anyone would like to talk through these changes, I'd be more than happy to do so—especially over coffee!

Absent any vigorous objections, the new practice will commence on the first Sunday of February, i.e., at the Masses on Saturday 4 February and Sunday 5 February.

gospel focus

Ranking

There is an odd line in today's passage. John reminds the crowd that he had said 'A man is coming after me who ranks before me because he existed before me.' In Jewish tradition, the prophets and patriarchs who came earlier in their history ranked higher than those who came later. They believed that the history of salvation was at its pinnacle with God's self-revelation to Abraham. Successive episodes and characters were regarded as lesser. But John affirms that Jesus ranks before himself because Jesus existed before John. He is saying that Jesus is more than simply the latest in a long line of prophets.
