A Pastoral Note...

One of the "benefits" of not going away to an event that is cancelled is that one gets to turn their attention to things that have been lingering in the background for some time.

Apart from undertaking some decluttering activities, my attention this part week has been focussed on the need to get on with the task of establishing a Pastoral Council for the two parishes.

Having finalised the Statutes of the proposed Pastoral Council, copies of which can be found on the website or requested from the Parish Office, I can now announce the following timetable for the establishment of the Pastoral Council of the Catholic Parishes of Dungog & Gresford:

- Close of nominations for elected members will 5pm on Sunday, 6 August 2023;
- Election of elected members, if necessary, will take place on Sunday, 20 August 2023;
- The new Council will take office on 1 October 2023.

Of course, all of that, and everything below, will mean nothing unless folks are prepared to step forward and offer themselves for election, or accept my offer of appointment. At the very heart of a successful Pastoral Council, however, is the necessity of holding elections, by which I mean there are so many people willing to serve on the Council for the sake of the parishes that we are forced to actually hold an election.

So please give some thought and prayer to who might be the right person to serve as a member of the Pastoral Council. And don't forget, that person might just be you!

So, a few answers to some expected questions:

What is the purpose of the Council?

This is a very good question, and one I have often been asked in other postings. Apart from being a requirement of diocesan law, the breadth of wisdom and experience that a Parish Council brings together is vital to ensuring a vibrant, active and engaged Parish community.

The purposes of the Council, as currently outlined in the Statutes are thus:

- Studying and assessing the pastoral life and works of the Parishes, and proposing a Pastoral Plan to meet them;
- Promoting safeguarding within the parishes;
- Developing and enacting practices to make the parishes child-safe organisations, and meet our obligations under civil and church law;
- For organising one Pastoral Assembly and one Pastoral Gathering during each term, i.e., each three years; and
- Providing advice and counsel on any matters he places before the Council.

What is the constitution of the Council?

Each of the two parishes will elect two members, and I will appoint two other members. In addition, there are some ex officio members: any assistant priests or deacons (we have none), the Principal of any parish school (we only have one), and the Parish Promoter of Safeguarding (we currently do not have one).

In theory, therefore, the Pastoral Council will have a membership of nine.

As the Council is advisory to the Parish Priest, I am not a member of the Pastoral Council, although I attend and preside over all meetings of the Council.

What is the term of the Council?

For elected and appointed members, the term of the Council is three years. The nature of ex officio members is that they stay part of the Council while they hold their position.

Who can nominate for election?

The qualification for election (and this for being appointed) are contained in the Statutes—see section 4.2. To be elected or appointed, an individual must be:

- A member of the Church, and
- Over the age of eighteen, and
- Be "outstanding in firm faith, high moral standards and prudence, and
- Live within the boundaries of the Parish for whom they will be elected or appointed, or
- Not living within the Parish, regularly attend Sunday Mass in the Parish.

Who can vote in the election?

The qualifications for voting in an election are the same as the qualifications for being elected, with the exception of the requirement to be "outstanding in firm faith, high moral standards and prudence".

As strange as it may sound, in order to give effect to the establishment, I have issued two decrees dated 30 June 2023 and which take effect on 1 July 2023:

The first—2023/001—approves and promulgates the Statutes of the Pastoral Council of the Catholic Parishes of Dungog & Gresford.

The Statutes are, for want of a better description, the constitution of the Council, describing its purpose, its membership, how it operates, etc. No collegiate body in the Church should have Statutes to guide how it works and operates.

The second decree—2023/002—both establishes the Parish Council formally, and details the various and necessary requirements for holding the first election. Subsequent elections will be governed by the Statutes of the Council themselves.
