## A Pastoral Note...

I don't know about you, but I have often been mildly amused at some of the shenanigans that take place in places we often call 'Parliament'. The behaviour of some members of that august body often leaves much to be desired, even if it is 'entertaining' in the widest sense of that word.

One of the things that is often missing from that place is the possibility of members listening to each other, being far more focussed on making their particular point in whatever manner they wish to do so.

Listening, and by that I mean really engaging in being attentive to what is being said, is an artform that requires the one doing the listening to focus on what the person speaking is saying and not on using the time to prepare their next remarks. It's only when the speaker has finished speaking that it is possible to formulate a response, and sometimes this requires a pause, a silence if you will, before a response is possible.

And just as this is the case with human to human communication, so it is even more true when humans communicate with God.

Prayer, the act of communication between God and humanity, remains a two-way process. God speaks, we listen; we speak, God listens. And in between there is often the need for silence so that we can hear what God is saying before we are able to provide our response.

Prayer is not always about us saying things, but about us getting the balance between listening, truly listening, and speaking right.

Like our parliamentarians that required period of waiting before responding can be a difficult aspect of our spiritual life to embrace. But it remains a vital part of ensuring a rich and vibrant prayer life.

And on that note, I'm going to 'practice what I preach', and move from speaking (or writing in this case) into silence.

## Separation

The image of Jesus still ashore while the disciples battled against strong winds and rising seas must have been an evocative one for the Matthean community. Like the disciples, they were acutely aware of their separation from Jesus. Unlike the disciples, they were separated by time and the raging storm that beset them was a tide of suspicion and persecution. At times they felt the strength and courage of Peter to step out of the boat and be Jesus in their world, but at other times they doubted their own abilities. It is a message for the Church of the day and the Church of today.
