A Pastoral Note...

And so another school term comes to an end, and I hope that both students and teachers will find the next two weeks a chance to stop and catch their collective breaths before launching into Term 2.

Regretfully the new kindergarten classroom will not be ready to be occupied at the beginning of the new term, an outcome that means parishioners will be without access to that space for meetings, morning teas, and the other activities that have usually taken place therein.

The latest information from the builders indicates that the 'new' completion date is towards the end of May, a date that is less weather dependent now that the shell has been constructed and the roof completed.

To say I am disappointed by this development would be understatement, and I have expressed that disappointment to the 'powers that be' within the diocesan offices. I can well understand the difficulties and unexpected developments that can cause delays in building projects—but the new classroom was initially approved in late 2022 and originally promised for delivery in time for the end of the 2023 school year! I think the saying goes "Not happy, Jan!"

In expressing that disappointment, however, I was sure to direct towards those responsible, which was not our school community. I am grateful that the relationship between the parish and the parish school is such that we are able to offer them the use of the hall. I have to say that such arrangements might not be possible in some parts of the diocese—but not here.

We look forward to the completion of the building project.

And speaking of our parish school, don't forget that some of the children of our parish who are also students of that school will celebrate their Confirmation this week (see notice opposite). Such celebrations are always wonderful occasions in the life of a parish community, and I hope I will some of our parishioners come along to be part of that celebration to pray and to witness to the significance of this occasion for the whole parish not just the children being confirmed.

And lastly, a clarification from last week's column: as reported, at this point in time I have been appointed as Administrator of Gloucester Parish but not (yet) of Krambach Parish.

There are other conversations taking place around Krambach and the outcome of those conversations will determine what role, if any, I might have in that parish.

That will teach me to read formal decrees from the Bishop before I write things in the bulletin!

Post-resurrection accounts

All four gospels include post-resurrection appearances of the risen Jesus. The gospel of Mark – historically, the first written – gives the briefest account of the resurrection discovery and it is only in a later addition to the gospel that a post-resurrection account appears. However, by the time the gospel of John was written, some 20-30 years later, the theological importance of the resurrection had gained more significance as it became more obvious that Jesus' return to the world was not going to happen within the foreseeable future. The gospel of John devotes two whole chapters to the post-resurrection appearances of Jesus.

Is It Time To Reintroduce Collections?

Homily by Fr Richard Leonard SJ

Sometimes the lectionary cuts a gospel story off too soon. Today we hear from the last chapter of Luke's Gospel where there are four accounts of how the disciples came to believe in the resurrection of Jesus. In the first two stories Mary Magdalene and then Peter come to see that Jesus has been raised from the dead because they found his tomb empty. The third story is set on the Road to Emmaus. Today's gospel is where Jesus appears to the apostles and disciples en masse, but it finishes at verse 48. In the next few verses Jesus tells the disciples that he is sending them out to be his witnesses in the world, and then he ascends to the Father.

The Church finishes the passage early because it does not want to pre-empt the feast of the Ascension, but by doing so it does the story an injustice. We are used to hearing how the Road to Emmaus mirrors what we do here at Mass each Sunday. But if we include Luke chapter 24, verses 49 to 50, then we can see that today's Gospel does the same thing. The verbs tell the story. In today's Gospel Jesus is present to the disciples; he gives himself to them to be seen and held; he eats with them; teaches them about the scriptures; and he commissions them to go out.

As a result of that first Easter we gather here each Sunday to remember and make Easter present again. This is the reason, for example, we talk about the 40 days of Lent when in fact there are 45 days from Ash Wednesday to the Easter Vigil. In or outside the Easter season Sundays are always days of the Resurrection. And just like the first Easter Sunday we believe that Christ continues to invite us here; to teach us about how to understand the scriptures and live them out in our daily lives; is present to us, to have and to hold, in his Word, this community, the presider and in a special way in the Eucharistic meal; and that he sends us out to proclaim his saving love with heroic joy.

To enable us to do all this we receive the same gift Jesus gave the first disciples as well, the gift of peace. But sometimes we have to get creative about how we achieve it, like the old man who purchased a retirement home near a high school. He spent the first few weeks in peace and contentment. Then a new school year began. The very next afternoon three young men came down his street beating merrily on every rubbish bin they encountered. The crashing percussion continued day after day, until finally the old man decided to take some action. The next afternoon, he walked out to meet the young percussionists. He called out, 'You kids are a lot of fun. Will you do me a favour? I'll give you each a dollar if you'll promise to come around every day and do your

thing.' The kids were elated and continued to do a bang-up job on the rubbish bins. A few days later, the retiree approached them again, 'Look' he said. 'I haven't received my pension cheque this month, so I'm not going to be able to give you more than 25 cents. Will that be okay?' '25 cents?' the drum leader exclaimed. 'If you think we're going to waste our time beating these bins for 25 cents, you're nuts! No way, mister. We quit!' And the old man enjoyed peace and quiet for the rest of his days.

So as Christ sends us forth today, may we be wise about how we can create some happiness and peace around us as well.

The problem arises when this is as far as we go. If we stop at this stage then we are shutting ourselves off from the richness of the scriptures. If we fail to dig below the surface then we are denying ourselves the opportunity of scrutinising our lives in the light of the scripture.
