

A Pastoral Note...

In the bulletin of 7 July I raised for discussion the possibility of merging the currently separate parishes of Dungog and Gresford into a new combined parish, predominantly to bring together the various administrative requirements currently required to be undertaken twice.

If that merger were to proceed—and I stress 'if' as we have not yet met to discuss and decide—there would also need to be a decision made about the patron for the new parish entity.

Currently, the two parishes of **St Mary's**, Dungog and **St Helen's** Gresford have those Saints as the parish patrons, but each also has another church patron (St Patrick's, and Sacred Heart) within it.

While a decision about a new name of a parish might be as simple as the 'Catholic Parish of Dungog & Gresford', a decision about a new saintly patron is a more problematic issue, if for no other reason than we should perhaps avoid adopting any of the titles our two parishes currently use.

And so along with giving some thought to the possibility of merging our two parishes, so that we can discuss and make decisions about that later in the year, it would also be good to give some thought to which saintly patron we might wish to adopt.

It cannot be St Mary (under any title), St Helen, St Patrick or Sacred Heart (which might also rule out any of the titles traditionally associated with Jesus). But that leaves a huge range of possibilities for us to consider, discuss, and suggest to Bishop Michael as a new patron for a new combined parish entity.

So give it some thought, talk amongst yourselves, and let's see if we can come up with something suitable...and as unique as we are!

Homily by Fr Michael Tate

As you know, when a Pope is elected, clean straw is burned in a little stove in a corner of the Sistine chapel and white smoke emerges from the chimney. A little while later the Pope appears on the balcony and tells us what name he will adopt.

A few days later, there is a major liturgy when the Pope is installed as Bishop of Rome. For centuries, at that ceremony a triple crown was placed on the Pope's head to signify his dominion and sovereignty over all spheres of creation.

Pope Paul VI did away with that crowning ceremony and said that the title by which he especially wanted to be known was 'Servant of the Servants of God'. He had listened to today's gospel: 'If anyone wants to be first, he must make himself last and servant of all.' The Pope allowed the way he exercised power to be transformed.

Jesus was well aware of the constant temptation for the leaders amongst his followers to allow themselves to be conditioned by the surrounding social and political structures.

He encountered it in today's gospel. He became aware that his disciples were disputing 'who is the greatest', so he decided to teach them a lesson by engaging in some counter-cultural, shocking street theatre: acting out the message he wanted to get across.

He took a child, not because he had some misty sentimental idea that all kids are little innocents but because, in his society, children were absolutely at the bottom of the social scale. They were non-entities until adulthood, totally under the control of the father of the household. They had no social value.

Jesus saw a young boy hovering on the edge of the crowd and beckoned him into the middle of his group of disciples.

In other words, Jesus took an utter nobody, a nonentity, and moved him from the margins of society to the centre, challenging his disciples to change their perspective.

This turns the whole social structure upside down. It subverts the whole idea of who is important and who is not. It revolutionises the notions of superiority and inferiority.

Our Lord is saying, 'Take the most vulnerable person in your society, make that person the centre of your attention, and change. Be prepared for some pain and turmoil in changing your perspective.'

How might this apply to us?

The aboriginal activist Michael Mansell gets under my skin. Every time he protests about this or that aboriginal cause, my hackles rise. Initially. But, consider the situation in the light of today's gospel.

The early European settlers did to the aboriginal people the exact opposite of what Our Lord acted out in today's gospel. They took a vulnerable people whose lives centred on a particular environment and, quite literally, dislocated them, pushed them to the margins of society, geographically and metaphorically.

There is another group which we have quite literally put beyond the margins. Asylum seekers, making their way by sea, have been sent to Papua New Guinea and Nauru. These are marginalised people whom Our Lord would bring to the front and centre of our attention so that our perspective is changed. Radically.

We are a Christian community. We have to take the gospel stories as the foundation and impetus for our lives. With the aboriginal people and their descendants we have to see them as the most marginalised inhabitants of our nation, people whom Our Lord would have brought to the centre of attention of his followers.

We may not agree on a single political response. But we must start with Jesus and his dramatic street theatre. If we do so we may find to our surprise that what Jesus said to his followers comes true for us. 'Anyone who welcomes one of these little ones in my name, welcomes me.'

Rev Prof Michael Tate graduated in Law from the University of Tasmania in 1968, and in Theology from Oxford University in 1971. He lectured at the University of Tasmania from 1972-78, being Dean of the Faculty of Law in 1977-78. He was a Senator for Tasmania from 1978-93, being Federal Minister for Justice from 1987-93. He served as Ambassador to The Hague and the Holy See from 1993-96. He then returned to Australia and was ordained in May 2000 and has been a parish priest in the Archdiocese of Hobart since then. He is an Honorary Professor of Law at the University of Tasmania where he lectures in International Humanitarian Law.


