# A Pastoral Note...

First things first.

Next Friday is All Saints Day, a day when we commemorate all those saintly figures who have gone before us in faith and are now part of the Church in the heavenly realm. While there would not normally be a morning Mass in St Mary's, Dungog on the first Friday of the month, because of the monthly Anointing Mass at Lara Aged Care, I will be an exception on this occasion because of the solemnity of the occasion.

Similarly, Mass will be celebrated at St Helen's, East Gresford on the Friday evening at 5.30pm.

Next Saturday is 'All Souls Day', and Mass will be celebrated at St Mary's, Dungog at 9.30am. I regret that with it being a Saturday I am unable to celebrate another Mass for 'All Souls Day'.

The month of November is the month when Catholics remember the faithful departed, and as we have done in the past, it would appropriate to celebrate a Mass in each of our churches across November to remember those whose funerals have been celebrated in the churches, those who are interred in our cemeteries, and those of our families and friends who have died in the last year.

I would ask each local community to decide when they might wish to celebrate this Mass and let me know. It could be celebrated as an weekday Mass or at one of our scheduled weekend Masses. I shall leave that choice to each community.

Once that decision is made, I shall add the event to the Parish calendar.

regular Masses and other liturgical celebrations.

I will keep this calendar updated with events as I become aware of them, as well as deleting those (including weekday Masses) that are cancelled for any reason.

For those technically inclined, it is also possible to 'subscribe' to this calendar and add it to your electronic diaries. There's a button at the bottom right of the calendar that permits this option.



# Homily by Michael Tate

Jericho was the last oasis-city for pilgrims making their way to Jerusalem. It was the last decent stop about 25 kilometres short of the Temple.

The closer the pilgrims got to their goal, the more beggars would congregate. In the Middle East, traditionally they sat on a cloak spread out in front of them onto which pilgrims would toss a small coin.

Bartimaeus shouted to Jesus: 'have pity on me'. The crowd at first told him to stop pestering Jesus, but he shouted all the more until Jesus stopped and called him over. And what does the Gospel then recount?

Bartimaeus threw his cloak aside, jumped up, and came to Jesus.

Bartimaeus could have stayed, you can stay, I can stay, sitting on the side of the road of life, content to have the security of the old familiar cloak, hoping for the occasional consolation of someone throwing us a few coins to feed our various hungers, especially of course, the deep down hunger for friendship or companionship.

Perhaps that is all that Bartimaeus initially wanted from Jesus: a *moment* of pity to him, the victim. Perhaps he didn't really want to do the gutsy thing and take a risk, the enormous risk of having his life changed forever. So, Jesus puts it to him: 'What do you want me to do for you?'

Bartimaeus answered: 'Master, let me see again again,' and he was cured of his disease and saved into a new way of living.

Our Lord offers us the same opportunity to start a new phase of life. What Jesus wants from you and from me is to get up from ground level (to 'jump up') in order to see things from a new perspective.

Our feet are still on the ground. We are still earthed. But, Jesus wants us to see things in the way he sees things.

Do you notice that if a friend wants you to focus on something at a distance, he or she will stand shoulder to shoulder with you and point you to the object he or she sees so clearly?

If we trust the friendship of our Lord and jump up and stand shoulder to shoulder with him, we can catch a glimpse of what is involved in following him on 'The Way' (the earliest name for what became Christianity).

And we know what that Way meant for Jesus and the early church, and perhaps for Bartimaeus himself. The crowd had called out to him: 'Take courage, get up, he is calling you.' Courage may be required to give up the familiar way of life, because in our heart we know that we are not living that fully human life for which we were created and for which we are yearning.

The Holy Spirit even now is speaking to your heart: 'Take courage, get up, He is calling you.'

Rev Prof Michael Tate graduated in Law from the University of Tasmania in 1968, and in Theology from Oxford University in 1971. He lectured at the University of Tasmania from 1972-78, being Dean of the Faculty of Law in 1977-78. He was a Senator for Tasmania from 1978-93, being Federal Minister for Justice from 1987-93. He served as Ambassador to The Hague and the Holy See from 1993-96. He then returned to Australia and was ordained in May 2000 and has been a parish priest in the Archdiocese of Hobart since then. He is an Honorary Professor of Law at the University of Tasmania where he lectures in International Humanitarian Law.



Perpetual Day of Remembrance Review

Bishop Michael has commissioned a review of the annual Perpetual Day of Remembrance. He writes:

It is now some time since my predecessor, Bishop William Wright, established the Perpetual Day of Remembrance in the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle to remember those who have suffered abuse at the hands of people who were entrusted with their protection. It is an occasion when we come together in prayer for all those affected by abuse and commit to ensuring that the past failings are never repeated.

The purpose for which this day was established remains ever important. Nevertheless, the way in which it is commemorated may be subject to change to ensure that its purpose is best achieved and that it remains meaningful.

To this end, I invite you to complete a brief survey (<u>P.D.R. Survey</u>) to help inform this process, so that we can make informed decisions about how the Perpetual Day of Remembrance might most effectively be commemorated into the future.

I encourage every parishioner to respond to the Bishop's invitation and contribute to this review. A small number of paper versions of the Survey are available in the churches. Completed copies can be returned directly to me. Fr Andrew
