A small booklet has been prepared with some biographical information on each of the nominees, and is available at the back of our churches this weekend. It is also available for download from the website (go to the 'Resources' page from the main menu).

A vote to discern the new patron will be taken on **Sunday 23 March** with the results announced on Sunday 30 March.

After the vote has been taken, the Bishop will be advised so that the name of our new patron can be included in the decree establishing our new parish.

It is important as we move into this next stage in the process of discerning a new patronal saint that we do so carefully and with some deliberation.

While we may have a particular favourite among the list of possible patrons that have been put forward—particularly if we were the one who nominated them—the **primary** determining factor should *not* be a question of personal taste or preference, but rather about whether the new patron can help us to bed down the new reality of having two parishes come together into one.

The new patron, whoever they might be, must be able to be someone around whom the new parish community—and its various communities—can gather. Their own history, their own story, their own relationship with Jesus is as important, if not more important, than their place in popular piety, either our own or more broadly.

To that end, **before you cast your vote** I would ask that you pray both for guidance in your own vote and for the guidance of the Holy Spirit to guide the community's discernment of who will be our patron and thus the focus of establishing our new parish identity.

Read the life of each of the saints who have been put forward, both in the prepared booklet and via your own resources. **Think** and **pray** about how each nominee might allow our new parish community to come together into the new reality that will come into being on 1 July.

Discuss the possibilities with other parishioners, making sure that you **listen** to what they might have to say with both an open spirit and a courteous manner. **Do not** engage in lobbying for your own preference, but be **open** to what God might be saying to you through other people.

Come to Mass on Sunday 23 March ready to cast your vote. You will be asked to express your preferences (at least 1 through 10, though you can continue with more if you wish) on the list of candidates. This is the same process used in most of our civil elections for the lower house of parliaments, so it won't be completely unfamiliar.

For those parishioners who might not be attending Mass on Sunday, don't panic! The ballot paper will be available on the website in the days leading up to Sunday 23 March. You will be able to download the ballot, complete it, and then return it to me electronically (by 5pm on Monday 24 March) for it to be included in the counting.

Alternatively, you could email me with your candidates in your order of preference by the same deadline (the email to use is andrew.doohan@mn.catholic.org.au) and thus you will have your vote included in the count.

This keeping of silence at the end of our Mass will be part of our communal Lenten discipline, a means of encouraging reflection as we leave the celebration of Eucharist to go out into the world.

Potential Changes At The Cathedral

The Catholic Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle is currently facing a space constraint in what was supposed to be the 'temporary' crypt located under the altar in the St John the Baptist Oratory in Maitland (the 'old cathedral'). It is here that the deceased Bishops are interred.

Various solutions to increase crypt space have been considered by diocesan leadership and it is now time to consult with parishioners and other stakeholders in the broader community in order that an informed decision can be made.

Anyone interested in this project is invited to attend one of two community consultation sessions to be held on Tuesday 11 March at 10am and repeated at 6pm in the Victor Peters Suite. 841 Hunter Street, Newcastle West.
