A Day With the Lord

On Friday 11 April, the Friday just before Holy Week begins, it is proposed that St Mary's, Dungog host a day long period of Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament.

The time will commence immediately after the 9.30am Mass and will continue until concluding with Benediction starting at 6pm.

The challenge with offering such a possibility is ensuring that the Blessed Sacrament is never left unaccompanied, that there is always someone present in the church.

At the back of St Mary's this weekend is a sign-up sheet where you can offer to participate in Adoration at some point across the day. The roster is broken up into half-hour slots, stretching from 10am until 6pm.

If you would like to participate in this celebration, please take the opportunity to add your name in one of the slots (each slot can have as many people present as they like). If you would like to add your name during the coming week, please contact Fr Andrew who can do this for you.

Please give some thought to this opportunity for a concentrated time of prayer before the Blessed Sacrament as part of your preparation for the celebration of Holy Week and the Sacred Paschal Triduum.

Please note: if we cannot fill all the available slots we will not be able to proceed.

Historical Context

Customs and culture

The parable of the lost son is a fascinating study of Jewish culture and purity laws. The son could not have distanced himself more from Jewish custom. Firstly, he demanded his inheritance, effectively treating his father as dead. Secondly, he travels to a pagan land and then in despair finds himself feeding pigs – animals whose meat was forbidden to Jews. He knows that his actions have alienated him from his family and culture and yet when he returns, his father gives him a fine robe and a ring to wear – signs of a father claiming a son as his own.

Truth and Reconciliation

For Jews, pigs are ritually unclean, so that living in a pig sty would make this young man unapproachable.

So, imagine the reaction of his Jewish audience when Jesus told the story of the father running to his son and embracing him still stinking of the pig sty, exclaiming, 'You were lost and now you are found.'

That is Jesus' portrayal of his heavenly Father's relationship with us.

Of course, sometimes we are the older brother, resentful that someone seems to have had too easy a time of God's forgiveness. Is this the attitude of many who challenge the emphasis by Pope Francis on Mercy as the core of God's relationship with us?

More often, we are like the younger brother who has strayed to a far off place, sometimes quite deliberately.

We could resolve to approach the Sacrament of Mercy during Lent, knowing that our heavenly Father will run towards us, embracing us, exclaiming, 'You were lost but now you are found.' That is worth a celebration!

Rev Prof Michael Tate graduated in Law from the University of Tasmania in 1968, and in Theology from Oxford University in 1971. He lectured at the University of Tasmania from 1972-78, being Dean of the Faculty of Law in 1977-78. He was a Senator for Tasmania from 1978-93, being Federal Minister for Justice from 1987-93. He served as Ambassador to The Hague and the Holy See from 1993-96. He then returned to Australia and was ordained in May 2000 and has been a parish priest in the Archdiocese of Hobart since then. He is an Honorary Professor of Law at the University of Tasmania where he lectures in International Humanitarian Law.
